Bullying and the Law

There is no legal definition of bullying

Schools have a duty of care to protect all pupils

The Government have issued statutory guidance Keeping Children Safe in Education (2016) which describes what schools must comply with. Schools also have obligations under the statutory guidance Working together to Safeguard Children (2015). Safeguarding is not just about Child Protection; the guidance states that it specifically covers other issues such as health, safety and bullying.

- ▶ Get information about anti-bullying week and school prevention strategies

- ▶ Have an open conversation about the school behaviour policy
- ▶ Learn how to approach incidents in school
- ▶ Form long term awareness to protect our children

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Anti-Bullying Week

- ▶ Annual event in November. All schools encouraged to take part. Different theme each year.
- ▶ All Together Programme funded by DfE. Coalition of four organisations working together. Includes training day, audit tool, online surveys. If a school chooses to it can gain an award. Last year we achieved a Silver Award.

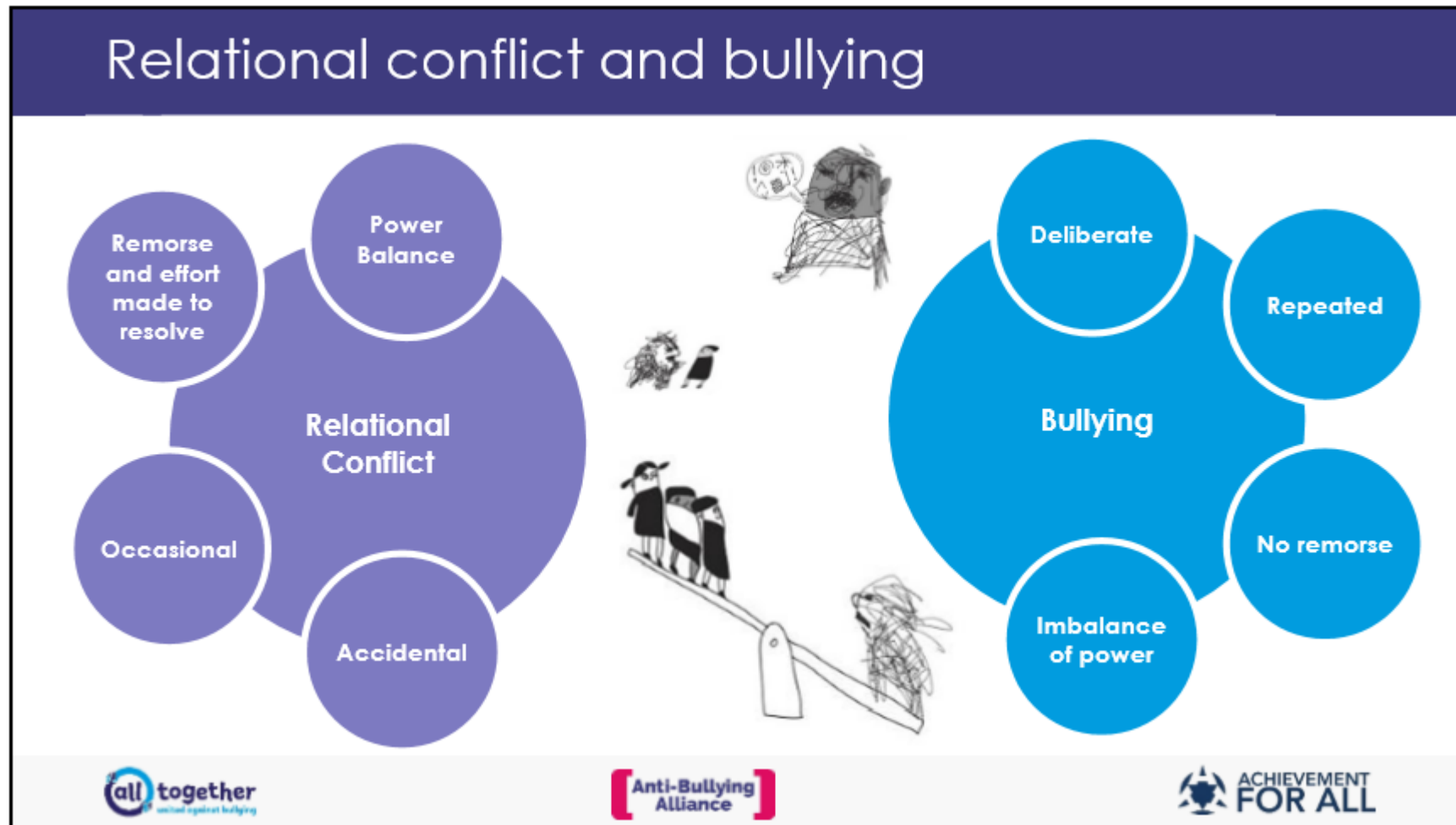
Discuss

(Anti-Bullying Alliance definition)

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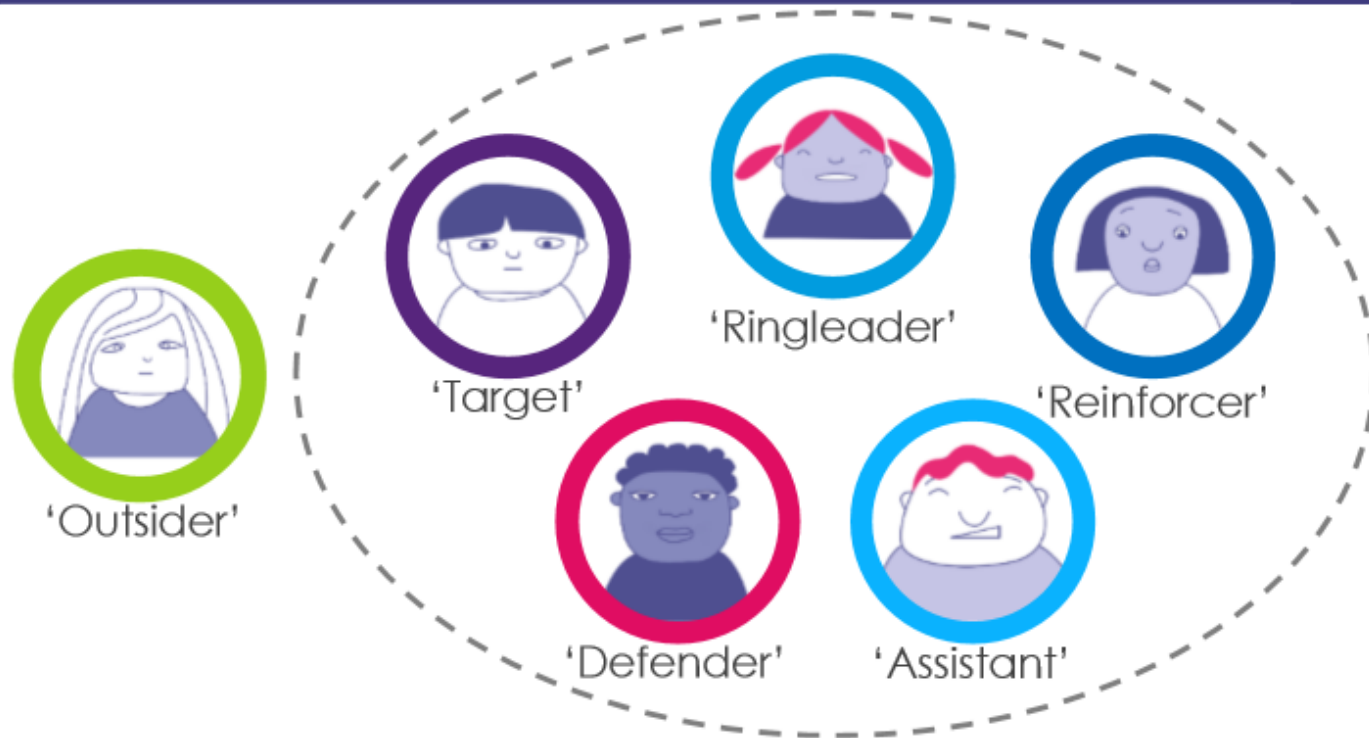


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- ▶ The bullying group- explore
